What is Pupil Premium?

Pupil Premium was introduced in April 2011. It is additional funding that the government gives to schools for each pupil on roll who is entitled to free school meals and have been for the last 6 years. Schools also receive Pupil Premium funding for looked after children or children whose parents work for the Armed Forces. The money must be spent to support the education of these children, and it is for the school to determine how that money must be spent. Please read the information below which details how our budget is spent.
