# Geographers On Tour

The Geography Department has had an incredibly busy year visiting various places around the North of England. Fieldwork is vital for our students as they gain first-hand experience of how to conduct experiments and also investigate local issues. We always try to stay as close to Newcastle as possible as this increases affordability, encourages students to investigate their own environment, and allows the maximum number of students to participate.

The year started with a fantastic residential visit to the Lake District for all the A-Level students. They survived almost a full week in the cold and wet surrounded by rugged scenery and without any mobile phone signal. The week was fantastic for team-bonding and also for getting the students to understand the geography of the area. They were lucky enough to explore glaciated landscapes close to Easedale Tarn, river environments along the River Mickleden, and settlements in Hawkshead and Ambleside.

The AS students visited York to study its flood defences and investigated changing settlement types in Northumberland and Newcastle. A fantastic tour of Newcastle's Grainger Town, which explored its historical development and current renaissance, was led by Mrs Jill Young, mother of Emma (Year 11), Rachael (Year 9) and Daniel (Year 7). As always, this was incredibly informative and we are indebted to Jill for her knowledge, humour, expertise and time.

Year 9 students have also been active in the local area, studying the infamous South Gosforth double-roundabout. They investigated traffic volumes and the safety features of this notorious accident blackspot before making proposals for improving the system. Following this, the department received a fan-

Finally, half of all the GCSE students in Year 10 recently conducted an investigation of stretches of the River Breamish in the Northumberland National Park.

Despite the usual inclement weather, the students were in high spirits and have produced some fantastic work using the data that they collected. One student, Emily Ridyard, said: "It was fun and educational, and I had a really good time."

# British Biathlon Finals

This was a truly fantastic achievement as over 5,500 students originally entered the competition. I arrived at the London Aquatics Centre early one rainy day in March. I had to wait a long time until the warm-up for my 100 metre swim. The warm-up lasted ten minutes and, after this, I nervously waited on my block for the race to begin. There was silence; you could hear a pin drop. The gun went off and the poolside crowd erupted with cheers. I finished eighth in my heat but still recorded my best time ever.

Once I had finished the swim, I ran to the changing-rooms to get ready for the 1,600 metre run. Outside it was freezing and rainy. I warmed up properly so I was prepared and succeeded in finishing fourth in my heat. I completed the race well below seven minutes and a good minute faster than my qualifying time.

Overall, I finished sixth in Britain and third in the North of England. I was proud of myself and would recommend biathlon to anyone who likes running and swimming.

## Language Students' University Experience

Earlier this year, AS and A-Level English Language students attended an event at Newcastle University. During the day, students took part in a series of lectures on topics relevant to their studies. They also received an introduction to academic life and experienced learning within a higher educational context.

The majority of sessions concentrated on the knowledge and skills needed for exams which all the students found really useful. Lectures delivered by examiners gave students invaluable first-hand advice on how to maximise their potential and really boosted their confidence. The topics covered ranged from child language acquisition, language change in the Seventeenth Century, attitudes to language, and language and technology.

Students also had the chance to attend lectures on an exciting range of areas in linguistics that included accents and dialects and forensic linguistics. Students were even told about new data concerning North East accents and were given the opportunity to contribute to ongoing research by offering their opinions on a range of recordings.

Finally, the Year 13s listened to crime writer and forensic linguist, Danuta Reah, who delivered a fascinating talk on the authorship of the infamous Jack the Ripper letters. Although unrelated to the A-Level course, the students enjoyed discovering how linguistics can be applied in an occupational context.

# Tasting Life On A Farm

Treginnis Farm, on the picturesque Pembrokeshire coast in Wales, proved to be the perfect place for Year 7 students to learn about life on a farm.

As part of the 'Farms For City Children' initiative, which is supported by the author Michael Morpurgo, the students swapped their usual classroom routines to spend a week living and working on the farm, which is located near Britain's smallest city, St David's.

With each day starting at 7.30 a.m. prompt, this was certainly no holiday for the students. On the contrary, the visit gave them a real opportunity to learn how a commercial farm operates, experience rural life and undertake many of the day-to-day activities that this all entails.

Daily tasks included feeding and mucking-out a range of livestock such as goats, sheep, cows, chickens, turkeys, hens, pigs and donkeys. There were also other chores ranging from chopping wood and cleaning-out stables to working in the farm garden and preparing food for meals.

Visiting the farm in late April and early May also ensured that some students had the opportunity to see the birth of a lamb, while all

During the stay, the Year 7s also enjoyed a visit to St David's twelfth-century cathedral, walks around the Pembrokeshire coastline, and trips to some of the many beaches and bays that are dotted around the area.

# Young Scientists Leading The Way

A team of enthusiastic Year 9 scientists has been working on an exciting project with the help of Dr Jankowski since January. The Leading Edge project encourages young people with an interest in science to develop their skills and talents in the subject. This involves working in close collaboration with leading local academics on some cutting-edge scientific research.

The six students – Mark Broughton,

Laura Dyter, Callum Grimes, James Metcalf, Rose Nicholson and Erin Pennock – have been working with Dr Sarah Judge from the Toxicological Department of Newcastle University's Medical School. The students have researched the viability of a new and exciting invertebrate model using flatworms to investigate the adverse toxicological effects of food additives such as the artificial sweetener, aspartame. During their lab work, the students handled a lot of up-to-date equipment with confidence.

The students' research was of such a high standard that Dr Judge is currently preparing the team's preliminary findings for publication in a leading scientific journal. Responding to this news, Mark Broughton said: "I never thought that this project would lead to me seeing my name in print."

The students were recently taken on a day-trip to London to visit the Science and Natural History Museums and the prestigious Royal Society. This was the culmination of a fantastic year-long journey through toxicology.

# What's Been Taking Place In The Library?

The Library has continued to grow this term with the addition of more new books that have helped to bring the total bought this year to over 1,200. Many of these titles have been recommended by those students who have used the 'Suggest A Book' feature that is part of the Library's dedicated website ([our-library.org.uk](http://our-library.org.uk)).

The excitement generated by the brand-new books – the many new graphic novels have been especially popular – has meant that the Library remains a vibrant and busy place. Since September, it has again attracted over 47,000 individual visitors. The Library has also processed the loan of more than 5,500 books, an increase of 1,000 on last year's total. These are very impressive figures which testify not only to the Library's popularity with students but also to the strong reading culture that is an important part of the school. Encouragingly, boys at St Mary's are as active as girls in borrowing books from the Library.

On the chess-scene, this has been another exciting and competitive year with the Library once again offering students the chance to take
